

Month dedicated to Our Lady



On 14 May 1862, Don Bosco dreamed about the battles the Church would face in the latter days. In his dream, the Pope of those days anchors the 'ship' of the Church between two pillars, one with a statue of Our Lady (the Auxilium Christianorum or 'Help of Christians') and the other with a large Eucharistic Host.

St John Bosco wrote about his congregation, the Salesians: "The principal objective is to promote veneration of the Blessed Sacrament and devotion to Mary, Help of Christians. This title seems to please the august Queen of Heaven very much."

LITURGY IN THE HOME

Pentecost—Whitsun

Red roses should decorate our shrines on Whitsunday; and, when I was a boy, we used to gather buttercups for the same purpose. Morning and evening prayers could include this one: 'O Holy Spirit, soul of my soul, I adore thee: enlighten, guide, strengthen and console me. Tell me what I ought to do, and command me to do it. I promise to be submissive to everything that thou shalt ask and to accept all that thou permittest to happen to me; only show me what is thy will.

Christians of old celebrated this feast with games and races and toasted the Church in Whitsun ale, for, after all, this is the Church's birthday. The Church blesses ale in her liturgy as follows: 'Bless, O Lord, this creature, ale, which by thy power has been produced from kernels of grain. May it be a healthful beverage to mankind, and grant that through the invoking of thy name all who drink it may find a help in body and a protection of soul. Amen.'

Toast the Church in ale today.

And, for tea, Strawberry Cake with frosting as red as the vestments at Mass on Pentecost:

1 cake yeast

1 teaspoon salt

1 cup warm milk

I teaspoon grated lemon rind

21 cups sifted flour

½ cup shortening

3 tablespoons sugar

Mix yeast in warm milk with a quarter-cup flour. Cover and let rise until light. Cream shortening and sugar. Add lemon and salt. Beat in eggs one at a time. Add yeast mixture and rest of flour. Beat for fifteen minutes. Pour the bubbling dough into a greased tube pan. Allow the dough to rise until double in bulk. Bake in a moderate oven for forty-five minutes. When the cake is done, remove it from the oven. Turn the pan upside down and let the cake slide out. Stab the bottom of the cake with a long-tined fork. Place the cake in a dish containing:

3 tablespoons rum

½ cup sugar ½ cup boiling water


(Boil the sugar with the water for ten minutes. Then take the syrup from the stove and add the rum.) Allow the cake to absorb the sweet rum flavour. Then spread the top with:

1 cup strawberries

Whole strawberries

1 cup sugar

Cook mashed berries with sugar before spreading them on the cake. Use the whole berries to decorate the cake.





Trinity Sunday

The first Sunday after Pentecost is Trinity Sunday. It's a peculiarly appropriate feast for modern times, because it was started in the days of the Arian heresy - the heresy which stated that Jesus Christ was essentially a very holy man, but not fully the Son of God. This is a heresy which has resurfaced again in our own day: you will find many people saying that Jesus was a revolutionary, or a caring social welfare worker, or a community leader, and that His Death on the Cross was a statement against injustice or an example of martyrdom like that of so many other men and women who have been persecuted for their political convictions down the ages. It is a denial and a distortion of authentic Christian doctrine. Trinity Sunday cuts across the heresies and reminds us of the fundamental truth: that Jesus Christ is God, one of the Trinity with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

Trinity Pineapple Cake

You will need: 4 oz butter or margarine 4 oz castor or granulated sugar 4 oz self-raising flour two beaten eggs and for the filling: 3 oz softened butter 5 oz icing sugar one tin of pineapple slices (NOT chunks)

Cream the butter and sugar together, add the eggs and then the flour. Divide the mixture into two and bake in two well-greased round cake tins for twenty minutes. Turn out and cool.

To make the filling, simply cream together the butter and icing sugar, then add some of the syrup from the tinned pineapple until the mixture is of the right consistency for spreading. Then take three of the pineapple rings and leave them on one side. Slice up the other rings into chunks and add them to the icing mixture. Sandwich the two halves of the sponge cake together with this. Now dredge the top of the cake generously with icing sugar and place the three pineapple rings on it in a Trinity symbol.


You can serve this cake with scoops of vanilla ice-cream or with dollops of thick whipped cream—or both if you like.

- 6. GOODNESS, by which we advoid injuring others, and are always ready to be of service to others.
- 7. LONGANIMITY, by which we persevere steadfastlyin our duty; and never stop or grow weary, whatever trials we may have to endure.
- 8. MILDNESS, which keeps back all motions of passion and anger, and makes a person really amiable and beloved both by God and man.
- 9. FIDELITY, which enables us to keep our engagements and fulfil our promises.
- 10. MODESTY, which enables us to observe a becoming deportment and reservation in all our outward actions, and advoid bestowing an undue amount of praise upon ourselves.
- CONTINENCY, which enables us to restrain and resist carnal inclinations, and become abstemious both in our meat and drink.
- 12. CHASTITY, by which we are enabled to keep a pure soul in a pure body, and have a great love and esteem for angelic purity.
