#### FROM THE CHAPLAIN

Dear Crusaders and Friends,

Last month we considered how our effort to become saints is really the work of our whole life. The life of a Crusader is the life of one given to Jesus in everything – not just in his prayers and good works, but in every duty and recreation of everyday. In other words, the goal of the true Crusader of the Eucharist is a real conversion of heart to live the reality of his baptism by the transformation of his entire being into the likeness of Jesus Christ.

St Paul says that we die to sin by baptism to rise to the new life of grace in Jesus Christ. In the Passion of Our Lord. He died to the life of this world, taking upon Himself the punishment of our sins. When Our Lord rose form the dead. He rose to a new and glorious life which is the fruit of His victory over sin on the Cross. And so it is for us: when we are baptised, we die to the life of sin with its preoccupation in the things of this world. This is the work of penance: making reparation for sin. But that is not the end of the story. We come out from baptism clothed in the immaculate garment of grace to live by the Life of God Himself, with a preoccupation for the things of God. This is the work of sanctification: becoming more like Jesus, the Son of God, by the practice of virtue.

Thus the conversion of heart that the Crusader strives to achieve is the turning away from sin together with the turning towards virtue ('conversion' means 'to turn towards'). If we are true Crusaders, we cannot ever rest and sav 'it is enough'. It is not enough to do penance and make reparation. You see, it is never enough when we could do more to please Our Lord Jesus Christ; becoming more and more like Him in our daily life – imitating His Charity, His Kindness, His Patience, His Perfect Obedience. His Profound Humility... each and every virtue that adorned His most perfect soul. Dying to sin must become fruitful by living to God.

So, dear Crusaders, let us get to work! Besides the generous practice of penance, we must really come to know Our Lord to imitate Him more surely. We have to study His Life – reading about Him in the Gospel, thinking about how He acted to please His Father and talking to Him about it. We should often like to take a mystery of the Rosary and think about how Our Lord practised virtue in that mystery and ask Him to help us do the same. Doing this is what we call mental prayer. A real Crusader tries to spend ten minutes each day talking to Jesus in mental prayer. It is the secret to becoming a saint.

Remember that during this month we will pray and make sacrifices especially for the mothers of families. Next month we will be praying for many priestly and religious vocations. Please be generous in filling out your Treasure Charts for these intentions.

### The Sisters' Corner

A Word of Encouragement from the SSPX Sisters in Sydney

Mrs. Martin, the mother of Saint Theresa of the Child Jesus, was the heart of her home because God was the centre of her own heart. Marie, Saint Theresa's oldest sister, said: "My mother had a deep faith, and when we heard her speak about eternity, even though we were very young, we felt disposed to see the things of this world as vanity." Let us imitate Marie, let us listen to this incomparable mother, Zelie Martin, speak about heaven and sanctity:

"I want to become a saint. It will not be easy. There is a lot to 'cut away' and the 'wood' is as hard as rock. It would have been better to start earlier when it was less difficult, but it is better late than never."

Mrs. Martin asked God to make her, and all her children, saints. She wrote: "This year, I will go again to visit the Blessed Virgin Mary (at Lourdes)... but I will no longer ask her for another little girl. I will only pray that the girls whom she has given me will all become saints and that I may do the same, but they must become better than me."

For that reason, despite the suffering it cost her, Mrs. Martin allowed herself to be separated from her children, so that they could go to a good boarding school: "I brought my girls to Le Mans. I gave up my two eldest daughters. You cannot imagine how much it cost me to send them far away from me, but we must know how to make sacrifices for their happiness."

Her desires for sanctity were very concrete since she practiced charity and had her children practice charity: "While coming home, we met a poor old man who had a very kind face. I sent Therese to give him a little alms. He looked so touched and he thanked us so much that I could see he was truly unfortunate. I told him to follow us and that I would give him some shoes. He came, and we gave him a good meal – he was starving to death."

However, this incomparable mother was found to have cancer. She regarded her sickness with perfect peace: "God is giving me the grace to not be afraid; I am very calm; I find that I am almost happy about it. I would not exchange places with anyone."

Her last words, written two weeks before her death, manifested her perfect abandonment to the will of God: "If the Blessed Virgin is not curing me, it is because my time has come and God wants me to rest somewhere else, instead of on this earth."

Dear Crusaders, during this month, pray that your family may become a saintly home. Pray that God may give us holy mothers that will be mothers of saints, like Zelie Martin was.

#### A Little Heart to Heart Talk

#10: Introibo ad Altare Dei (17-2-2023)

Dear Children,

"I will go unto the altar of God... In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen." Have you ever wondered why the priest says, Introibo ad altare Dei, "I will go unto the altar of God," when he already seems to be there at the altar? We can find a few reasons. In the early days (until about the 12th century) this part of the Mass used to be said as part of the priest's preparation for Mass, either in the sacristy where he puts on his vestments, or on his way to the altar. Now it is part of the Mass itself. Just like you girls prepare for Mass by finding your hats or veils, and you boys by straightening your ties, so the priest prepares himself for Mass, inside and out, in the sacristy. Even now, the priest is not quite at the altar when he says these words; or at least, he is only at the foot of the altar. Think of climbing a tree or a mountain. It is one thing to be at the foot and quite another to be at the top; there is a lot of effort in between. But oh, what a view from the top! That is why we call this part of the Mass "the prayers at the foot of the altar." Soon we will start climbing.

Introibo ad altare Dei. I will go unto the altar of God. There are three words that I want you to notice here: "I," "altar" and "God". Who is it that says "I"? First the priest, and then you (by the mouth and voice of the altar boy), and then the priest again. Introibo quo? Introibo ad ubi? In other words, where will I go? Unto the altar of God! What is an altar? An altar is a place of sacrifice. Whose altar? The altar of God! But are you not afraid to sacrifice? Are you worthy to appear before Almighty God? Perhaps you should send someone else? No, I will not stay behind, nor simply send someone else. Cost what it may, I will go!

We will go, but we will not go alone or in our own name. That is why we begin the Mass *in nomine Patris, et Filii, et Spiritui Sancto*. Do you recognize those sacred words? Your infant ears heard them, as water flowed over your tiny forehead, on the day of your baptism. Baptism


changed you forever! Now the Mass is yours, like it is Jesus', because the Mass makes you part of Jesus. When you go to Mass, you go with Jesus Himself, you go in the name of Jesus. The Mass is yours by baptism! Does that mean that you can say Mass by yourself? No, only a priest can do that. Even the priest does not do it in his own name. He must be ordained first, and only then can he offer the Sacrifice. He goes, not in his own name, nor on his own steam. He has been chosen by God the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. He has been called.

We call that a vocation, a priestly vocation. Usually, a priest hears this call when he is a young man. He has to pray hard, study hard, and make many sacrifices before he is allowed to become a priest; but he keeps saying to himself and to God: "I will go unto the altar of God. I will go unto the altar of God, cost what it may." And one fine day, he finally receives Holy Orders from the bishop, orders to go unto the altar of God, orders to offer Holy Mass! What joy belongs to the young priest on that day, on the day that he becomes a priest, on the day that he offers his first Mass. That joy should last his whole life long. How beautiful to hear a grey-haired old

priest still saying: Ad Deum qui laetificat juventutem meam. "I will go...to the God Who gives joy to my youth." He may not look very young, but the joy of his daily Mass keeps his heart young and fresh.

I pray that some of you boys also hear God's call to the altar, God's call to become priests. Today you can humbly ask Him to call you, if you wish. Come now, let us all, priest and children, boys and girls, "go unto the altar of God." Let us enter into the spirit of the Mass with joyful, youthful hearts.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

#### First Meditation

## The Cross-bearer of St. Mary's

Do you like to read stories about bravery? Sometimes it takes more courage to give up something one wants very much than it requires to ride through a storm or to return lost money. While you are reading this story, try to decide whether Tom was really brave, as well as faithful and earnest.

Tom Monroe, Bob Brown, and Joe Blake were altar boys at St. Mary's Cathedral, and very faithful ones they were. But Tom was the best of the three. The snow was never too deep for him to get to the six o'clock Mass; the rain might fall in torrents, but Tom was always ready in the sacristy when Father Daly came in to prepare for the early Mass. 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Fifth Station shows Simon taking the cross on his own shoulders."

"I suppose you are the best altar boy at the church," Mr. Nibs said, looking intently at Tom.

"Well, I always do all the important things," Tom admitted in a satisfied voice. He did not notice that Mr. Nibs had pulled his black-rimmed glasses away down on the tip of his nose and was looking at him sharply over them.

"I have been reading in the paper that a great cardinal has come from Rome to visit the cathedrals in this country," Mr. Nibs said, pushing his glasses back on his nose and beginning to sew the sole on a shoe. "Is he coming here?"

"Yes, he is coming to St. Mary's on Easter. All the altar boys are excited, because we've never seen a cardinal. Father Daly is drilling us, so that we'll be perfect. Forty altar boys, with the cross-bearer, will meet the cardinal, the bishop, and the priests at the door of the cathedral, and the cross-bearer will lead the procession up to the altar, where High Mass will be sung."

Mr. Nibs nodded his head. "And I suppose you will be the cross-



bearer?" he asked.

"Oh, I think so," Tom answered carelessly, "even though Father Daly has made a new rule. The cross-bearer on Easter will be the boy who is best in his class as well as most faithful in his duties as altar boy. Joe Blake gets better marks than I do, but I can beat him if I try."

This time Mr. Nibs pushed his glasses away up on his bald forehead and stared at Tom again. But he said, kindly enough, "I am coming to the church on Easter to watch you carry the cross." And as the boy went out of the door, Mr. Nibs called after him, "Good night, Little Simon of Cyrene!"

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The next two weeks were busy ones for Tom. Getting up early in the morning was easy enough, but trying to make the highest marks in his class was hard work. He sat up late at night to do arithmetic, and he even studied before breakfast. He was determined that no one but himself should be cross-bearer in the Easter procession.

"I wish Father Daly hadn't made the rule that the boy who is highest in his class will be cross-bearer," he grumbled to Bob one day, as they walked home from school together. "I have always carried the cross on feast days. Why can't I be the one to do it when the cardinal comes?"

## Crusader Games

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Here is an old-time game that our grandfathers and great-grandfathers used to play. It is also known as "Mill," "Morelles," or "Nine-Men's Morris." You can make your own playing board at home. Simply enlarge this grid onto a piece of cardboard or plywood, and you are ready to play. Use buttons for "men."

When my grandfathers played, they sometimes simply drew the grid on a piece of paper. I can still see them one day after dinner—fixing to play Mill. One of them had a folded piece of paper with the grid drawn on it and an envelope full of buttons—black ones and white ones—in his pocket. That's all they needed to have a game of Mill on the dining room table after the dishes were cleared away.

#### 1. Two players


#### **RULES**

the object of the game is to reduce the opponent's number of men to only two.

- 2. Each player chooses nine men (buttons) of one colour.
- 3. In turn, each player places one man on the board at any intersection lines or at any corner.
- 4. The first player to get three men in a line can remove from the board one of his opponent's men. He may take any man he wants except one of three already in a line, unless these are the only men left on the board.

(The line of three men is called a "mill." When a player manages to get three men in a line, he is said to have "made a mill.")

- 5. The line of three men must be horizontal or vertical; the diagonals in from the corners do not count.
- 6. As soon as all men are entered, the player can then begin to move his men about on his turn. Only one man can be moved, and can only be moved space (from one black dot to another) on a turn.



- 7. If a player has a line of three men in a row and moves a man out of this line, it is called "opening a mill." Always when he closes a mill, he can take one of his opponent's men away. (He may open a mill on one turn, and close it on the next.)
- 8. Sometimes a player can get his men so arranged that he can form and reform two lines alternately several times, and thus he can take one of his opponent's men from the board on every turn. This is called "Having an open and shut mill."
- 9. Play continues until one player has only three men left. When a player is down to only three men, he may then, on his turn, "hop" over other pieces to any vacant intersection or corner on the board.
- 10. As soon as an opponent is reduced to three men, he can also hop. The moment any player is reduced to only two men, he loses the game.

Many plans were discussed, but none of them was thought good enough. At last a very young Mouse got up and said:




